## The Joy and Comfort of Godly Repentance and Reconciliation 2 Corinthians 7:5-16

## BIG IDEA: Biblical reconciliation requires biblical repentance.

(This is true in both salvation/conversion and sanctification/Christian living.)

I. Paul reviews affliction and God's comfort in the process of biblical reconciliation. (7:5-7; 2:13)

II. Paul explains why he does not regret the grief that his "severe letter" had brought to the Corinthian believers. (7:8-9; 2:1-4)

## **Timeline Review:**

- Paul's 1<sup>st</sup> visit to Corinth and the planting/establishing of the Corinthian Church (Acts 18:1-17)
- Paul leaves for Palestine via Ephesus (Acts 18:18-22)
- Paul returns to Ephesus on his 3<sup>rd</sup> Missionary Journey (Acts 19)
- Paul's 1<sup>st</sup> letter to Corinth (1 Cor. 1:11; 5:9—written from Ephesus)
- The Corinthians write a letter to Paul with six questions (1 Cor. 7:1, 25; 8:1; 12:1; 16:1, 12)
- Paul's 2<sup>nd</sup> letter to Corinth ("1 Corinthians"; 1 Cor. 16:3-10)
- Paul's 2<sup>nd</sup> visit to Corinth is a "painful" visit (2 Cor. 2:1, 8-11; 7:12; 10-11; Acts 20:1-2
- Paul's 3<sup>rd</sup> letter to Corinth ("A Severe Letter"; 2 Cor. 2:3-4, 12-13; 7:5-16)
- Paul's 4<sup>th</sup> letter to Corinth ("2 Corinthians"; 2 Cor. 7:7; 13:1-2)
- Paul's 3<sup>rd</sup> visit to Corinth was in the works and seems to have taken place (2 Cor. 13:1-2;

Romans 15:25-27)

IV. Paul rejoices in the visible and ongoing fruit of biblical obedience, repentance, and reconciliation in the lives of the Corinthians. (7:13b-16)
