

The Triumphant Entry of the King
Luke 19:28-40

Context

9:51—*Jesus began a resolute journey to Jerusalem. This would be His final time to go there before heading to the cross.*

9:52-18:30—*Jesus was teaching the people in parables, was performing many miracles of healing, and had gathered a large crowd of people who followed Him from town to town.*

18:31-34—*Jesus revealed to the twelve disciples (for the third time) that He was heading to Jerusalem to both die and rise again from the dead. However, they were not allowed to fully understand what He meant at this time.*

18:35-43—*As He neared Jericho, Jesus miraculously healed a man who was born blind. This miracle overwhelmed His crowd of followers with awe and excitement.*

19:1-10—*Jesus had just worked repentance in the heart of a tax collector named Zacchaeus in the city of Jericho.*

19:11-27—*Jesus knew that the crowd was hopefully expecting Him to rule and reign as their promised Messiah King in the next couple of days. He gave them a parable that highlighted what God would do to those who rejected Him as their Messiah (vs. 14, 27).*

Narrative

19:28-31—*Jesus stopped at the Mount of Olives and sent two of His disciples into a small village to find a colt and bring it to Him.*

19:32-35—*After the two disciples found the colt (exactly like Jesus said they would), they brought it to Jesus Christ for Him to ride upon.*

19:36-40—*While Jesus was given a king's welcome by His disciples and the crowd of people, He was publicly rebuked and rejected by the Pharisees.*

BIG IDEA: God always fulfills His Word in His perfect time and way.

In Luke 19:28-40, we can observe (at least) **three reasons** why Jesus's "triumphant entry" into Jerusalem was truly triumphant:

I. Jesus's entrance into Jerusalem was triumphant because it highlighted the _____ and _____ of God's holy Word and Scriptures.

II. Jesus's entrance to Jerusalem was triumphant because it highlighted the _____ of God's holy Son.

III. Jesus's entrance to Jerusalem was triumphant because it highlighted the _____ of God's holy Gospel.

- *Philippians 2:5-11*
- *2 Corinthians 5:21; 8:9*

Implications & Application

1. Although God's Word is mainly rejected or **misunderstood** by man, God's Word is always true and will never be refuted.
2. Instead of rejecting God's Word, trust in and obey God's Word by first **believing in His Son for the forgiveness of your sin**.
3. Ask God to help you grow in your love for Him as you **grow in your understanding of and obedience to His Word**.
