BIG IDEA: True Christians are marked by a contentment in suffering for Christ.

I. Paul "boasts" of the special revelation(s) that he had received from Heaven. (12:1-4)

Although Paul could have boasted in these "revelations," he transitioned to focusing on his weaknesses. (12:5-6)

- II. Paul shares how God's grace and power are magnified in his Heaven-sent weakness. (12:7-9a)
- III. Paul "boasts" in his weaknesses, and accepts them as ordained by God, so that God's power can mightily rest on him. (12:9b-10)

Observations and Questions

- It is not wrong for Christians to ask God to heal or remove physical infirmities and weaknesses.
- However, it is wrong for Christians to refuse to accept God's answer!
- It is grace when God empowers Christians to trust and obey Him through ongoing physical weaknesses, trials, and persecution.
- Why can Christians be content in "weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities?"
- What Scriptural truths must Christians know and believe <u>before</u> difficult trials come?
- What Scriptural truths must Christians know and believe <u>during</u> difficult trials?
- What Scriptural truths must Christians know and believe after difficult trials?
